Quest. 12. Who have died this year?

Rev. C. G. Meredith, son of Samuel and Belinda Meredith, was born in Baltimore County, Maryland. May 5, 1820. He seems to have been remarkable from his childhood for his orderly behaviour and sobriety of temper; and at the early age of eleven he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and soon after professed conversion at a camp-meeting held on what was called Low's camp-ground, in the southern part of York County, Pa. Young Meredith was of Methodist stock; his grand-parents, as well as his parents, being members of the Church. The following extract from a letter, written by the Rev. Thomas Gorsuch, will convey a just idea of his early piety and promise to the Church: "After his conversion he was a model for all young Christians. He immediately, after joining the Church, commenced speaking in class. love-feast meetings, and praying in public. His praying and speaking often produced a powerful effect upon those present, as I now most distinctly recollect. Such was the consistency of his walk, and the depth of his piety and devotion, in connexion with his youth, that he became an object of remark among older Christians; and it was frequently predicted, when he was but a boy, that he would some day become a preacher of the gospel." Brother Meredith was a self-educated man, was fond of books and of study, and applied himself closely in the acquisition of literary, scientific, and theological knowledge. He read his New Testament in Greek and Latin, was well versed in the English branches, and was one of the best theologians of his age in the conference. In the pulpit he was dignified, instructive, and highly practical. His sermons were carefully prepared, and generally well adapted to the occasion; and, bating a



slight defect in distinctness of enunciation, were well delivered. As an administrator of discipline, he was judicious and safe, being mild, but firm. As a pastor, he had few superiors—faithful in his work, and happy in his intercourse with his people and with the community. Not only his late charge, but the Church must feel his loss. Brother Meredith was received on trial in what was then the Ohio Conference, in the autumn of 1846, and appointed to Wilmington Circuit, and the year following to Monroe Circuit, at the close of which he was ordained deacon, and received into full connexion with the conference. In 1849 he travelled Maysville Circuit, Kentucky, and was this year united in marriage to Miss Sarah E. Simmons, daughter of Rev. W. Simmons, of the Cincinnati Conference. In 1850 he was ordained elder, and appointed to Augusta Circuit, Kentucky. His next field was West White Oak, 1851; Batavia, 1852 and 1853; Lebanon Station, 1854, where he closed his life and labours together, July 16, 1854. His last sickness was sudden, and his death unexpected to himself and to his friends till a few hours before it occurred. Few, if any, had fairer promise of long life than he; yet the messenger came, and death took him away—took him away with a brief warning. But as in life, so also in death, he evinced the Christian's spirit and the Christian's hope. The Sabbath preceding the one on which he died was spent in Wilmington, in exchange with a ministerial brother. He preached three times on that day, and feeling somewhat indisposed, on next day returned home. He was not, however, considered seriously ill by his physician till Friday evening, when it was discovered that his brain was seriously affected, and that probably he could not live. The announcement of this fact to him, however, did not alarm him. It is true that most of the time from that period till his death he laboured under the influence of delirium, yet he had occasional lucid moments. A minister of a sister denomination, visiting him, remarked, that in all human probability he must soon leave them, and asked how he felt in view of such an event. He very calmly replied, "That he had attended to that matter before—that he was ready," and invited the minister to unite with them in prayer. He also made similar replies and requests to other friends who visited him. Some time after this he called his two little sons, Eddy and Willie, and affectionately embraced them, as though conscious that he would soon leave them. At a still later period he remarked, "It will soon be over." And when his speech failed, and he could no longer give utterance to his thoughts and feelings, he looked as though he would tell his weeping wife and sympathizing charge, "All is well; I'm going home." Thus sunk quietly and peacefully to rest another of God's servants; but he died at his post, with his armour on.
