Rev. JOHN HENRY AUGUST FUSS, born December 20, 1830, at Minden, kingdom of Prussia, immigrated to this country with his parents in 1848. In the following year he was converted, under the ministry of Rev. P. F. Schneider, and joined the English society of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Fremont, Ohio. Soon after he became a member of the German Mission in Detroit, and received license to preach in 1851. In the fall of the same year he went to Louisville, Kentucky, and labored under the presiding elder. The following year he was received on trial in the Southeastern Indiana Conference, and appointed successively to the following fields of labor: 1852, Brookville and Richmond; 1853, Palestine; 1854, Rockford; 1855, after being ordained deacon, Boonville; 1856, Aurora, during which year he was married to Miss Maria Elizabeth Storz. In 1857 he was ordained elder and sent to Lafayette, which charge he served for two years. In 1859 he was transferred to the Cincinnati Conference, and stationed in Everett-street, Cincinnati; 1860-61, he labored in Columbus; 1862, in Greenville and Piqua Circuit; 1863, in Hamilton; 1864, on Mt. Vernon, and 1865 on Huntingsburg Circuit, Central German Conference. In the fall of this year he took a cold, which affected his lungs and throat so that the beginning of consumption was soon visible. For several months he was unable to preach. During the summer, however, his health improved, and as he could not persuade himself to take a superannuated relation he was appointed to Newport, Kentucky, in the hope that he might there fully recover, having at that place not only the medical treatment of a dear friend, but also ministerial help in the pulpit from his brethren in Cincinnati. This hope, however, was not realized. He could serve his charge but a few months. The disease rapidly increased, and ended his life May 13, when he had reached the age of thirty-six years.

His departure is mourned not only by a lonely widow without children, but by the Church, which lost in him a laborer endowed with more than common gifts, which he improved by indefatigable study; a preacher whose discourses gave the proof that he made constant progress, and whose services on the conference floor showed that he understood and loved the genius and institutions of Methodism. Brother Fuss was a zealous servant of God; his whole soul was in the work, and the words which the writer of this sketch chose for his funeral discourse ("None of us liveth to himself, and no man dieth to himself. For whether we live, we live unto the Lord; and whether we die, we die unto the Lord; whether we live, therefore, or die, we are the Lord's." Rom. xiv, 7, 8) were expressive of the chief feature of his character. He lived not unto himself, but to the Lord. If he had sought his own temporal interests he could have made his mark in business, and especially in politics; but he esteemed the privilege of preaching the Gospel higher than wealth and honor before the world. Our obituary would not meet with the approval of our departed brother if we did not admit that he, like other men, had defects. He confessed them frankly, and not without grief. The very virtues peculiar to him, such as his habit to fully express whatever he considered true and right, without any reference to the pleasure or displeasure of others, and the firmness of his character, which made it very difficult for him to yield in any point what he had expressed as his deliberate and conscientious conviction, threw their corresponding shadows in consequence of the imperfection of our human nature. But as the life of the Christian is to be a school of discipline for all that desire not to live to themselves, the Holy Spirit purifies the temperament, knocks off the sharp corners, and transforms the character from one glory to another into the image of the Master. This was the case with Brother Fuss; the ardent love and high esteem toward him, of which the two last charges he served gave him the most affecting proofs, show that Brother Fuss learned to combine gentleness and a willingness to yield with his manly firmness.

Brother Fuss, as is generally the case in consumption, hoped to recover to the last. To preach was the joy of his heart, and he found it hard to reconcile himself to the thought that he should no more be permitted to preach the glorious Gospel of the blessed God. Nevertheless, he became resigned to the will of the Lord, and said he was convinced that the will of the Lord was good. Sometimes he was troubled in mind because he had not more inward joy, though he never doubted his acceptance with God. The day before his death Brother Krehbiel said to him, "Brother Fuss, you will soon be in heaven." He replied, "It would have given me pleasure to recover if it was the Lord's will, but only that I might preach the Gospel; if I cannot any more preach, I would rather die." On Monday morning, about half an hour before his death, some of his brethren in the ministry visited him. The questions proposed to him concerning his assurance of salvation he answered by nodding, being no more able to speak. Calmly he fell asleep in Jesus.
